From Your Favorite Pastor

Here we are at yet another Christmas, with most of us watching our calendars fill up faster than we can write it in. I have to check every day to make sure I'm not forgetting something! Then we get home, turn on the TV and see commercial after commercial about the latest, greatest gadgets and gifts for us to buy for someone, or even for ourselves.

It is also the time of year where we get moved by stories of those who put others first. One of those stories is about a boy you may have seen in the news. He found a \$20 bill in the parking lot of a restaurant and got very excited. He was going to buy a video game with it, until he saw a soldier walk in. He tells how it reminded him of his own dad, who died in Iraq 5 weeks after he was born. So, he wrote a note and put it with the \$20 bill to give it to the soldier for his dinner. That soldier used it to help someone else. People heard the story of this boy and decided to send him \$20 bills to replace the one he gave away. Instead, they give all that money to Snowball Express- a charity that helps kids who lost parents at war. In the first few years they raised over \$250,000, continuing to this day! All because a 4th grade boy put someone else first.

But it raises the question, why does it take Christmas or our hearts being choked up for us to possibly be motivated to do something ourselves? Why can't we find ways to do it year-round?

Christ tells us throughout Scripture that we are to give to others. He tells us to take care of poor, children, orphans, fatherless. He tells us to give according to what we have been given. And all we have been given comes from the One who wants us to give, but to do it with a cheerful heart. We see all of it in I Corinthians 8,9; I Chronicles 29; Luke 14; James 1; Numbers 18, and on and on.

Advent is a time of expectation and hope. “Advent” means “arrival” or “coming,” and it prompts us to pause each day in December and remember why Jesus came at Christmas. Traditions vary by country, but common ways of commemorating Jesus’ birth are through Advent calendars, wreaths, and candles. Ideally, any Advent tradition should involve families in a fun activity each day of December, helping them remember why we celebrate Christmas.

What Is the Advent Wreath?

The Advent wreath first appeared in Germany in 1839. A Lutheran minister working at a mission for children created a wreath out of the wheel of a cart. He placed twenty small red candles and four large white candles inside the ring. The red candles were lit on weekdays and the four white candles were lit on Sundays.

Eventually, the Advent wreath was created out of evergreens, symbolizing everlasting life in the midst of winter and death as the evergreen is continuously green. The circle reminds us of God’s unending love and the eternal life He makes possible.

Advent candles are often nestled in the evergreen wreath. Further detail on the purpose and meaning behind each advent candle appears below. Additional decorations, like holly and berries, are sometimes added. Their red color points ahead to Jesus’ sacrifice and death on the cross, shedding his blood for our sins. Pinecones can symbolize the new life that Jesus brings through His resurrection.

Meaning & Symbolism of the Advent Candles

Advent candles shine brightly in the midst of darkness, symbolizing and reminding us that Jesus came as Light into our dark world. The candles are often set in a circular Advent wreath. In Scandinavia, Lutheran churches light a candle each day of December; by Christmas, they have twenty-four candles burning.

The most common Advent candle tradition, however, involves four candles around the wreath. A new candle is lit on each of the four Sundays before Christmas. Each candle represents something different, although traditions vary. Often, the first, second, and fourth candles are purple; the third candle is rose-colored. A fifth white candle is placed in the middle of the wreath and is lit on Christmas Day to celebrate Jesus’ birth.

The **first candle** symbolizes **hope** and is called the "Prophet’s Candle." The prophets of the Old Testament, especially Isaiah, waited in hope for the Messiah’s arrival.

The **second candle** represents **faith** and is called "Bethlehem’s Candle." Micah had foretold that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem, which is also the birthplace of King David.

The **third candle (pink)** symbolizes **joy** and is called the "Shepherd’s Candle." To the shepherd’s great joy, the angels announced that Jesus came for humble, unimportant people like them, too. In liturgy, the color rose signifies joy.

The **fourth candle** represents **peace** and is called the "Angel’s Candle." The angels announced that Jesus came to bring peace--He came to bring people close to God and to each other again.

The **fifth candle** represents **light and purity** and is called "Christ’s candle." It is placed in the middle and is lit on Christmas Eve (unless Christmas falls on Sunday or when being celebrated in your home).

How Do We Know Jesus Was Born of a Virgin?

The virgin birth is one of the most commonly attacked miracles associated with Jesus' life. The attacks generally fall into two categories: They either attack the idea of the virgin birth or the translation of the word *virgin*.

To many modern people, being born of a virgin sounds like the origin of a superhero. They think it is just a legend. But the idea sounded just as bizarre to Mary. Luke 1:34 tell us that when the angel Gabriel announced to Mary that she would give birth to the Son

of God, she replied, "How can this be, since I have not been intimate with a man?" The fact that Luke calls her a virgin twice in verse 27 helps set the stage for Mary's skeptical reaction. And Matthew 1:18 tells us the same thing: Mary had not had the kind of relationship that would leave her pregnant.

However, Gabriel's response to Mary is very telling: "For nothing will be impossible with God" (Luke 1:37). In other words, Mary's pregnancy will be a miracle. People who reject the virgin birth do so because they don't think miracles are possible. They see Jesus as a good teacher, not divine. But evidence for Jesus' resurrection and the arguments for God's existence give us excellent reasons to think that miracles are possible and that Jesus was God incarnate. And if there are excellent reasons to think God exists then miracles are certainly possible. To reject the possibility of miracles is simply an anti-supernatural bias that presupposes atheism.

The other way of attacking the virgin birth is to attack the translation of the word *virgin*. Matthew 1:22 claims the virgin birth took place to fulfill the prophecy found in Isaiah 7:14. And in verse 23, Matthew quotes the prophecy as saying, "the virgin will become pregnant." The question is: Did the Hebrew word Isaiah used mean "virgin"? Hebrew has a specific word for *virgin*, but Isaiah didn't use it. Instead he used a word meaning "young woman." Virginity is often a part of what this word means, but not necessarily. Critics thus argue that Matthew made Isaiah say something he didn't mean, but this argument fails, because Matthew is quoting from the Greek translation of the Old Testament, and the word used there specifically means virgin. The Greek translation was made by Jewish scholars about 250 years before Jesus was born. They knew what tradition said Isaiah meant by the term he used in Isaiah 7:14 and translated it to 'virgin'. Matthew's use of virgin is thus an accurate translation.

Lastly, the virgin birth provides a way for us to connect some dots. If Jesus came to die for the sins of His people (Matthew 1:21), He could have to be sinless. To be a proper sacrifice He would also have to be fully human to fulfill the law perfectly. And to be able to pay for sin, He would have to be fully divine. The virgin birth provides a way for a divine Jesus to be born fully human, but without inheriting a sinful nature from Adam's fall.

Peppermint Bath Salts

INGREDIENTS

- * 3 cups Epsom Salts
- * 2 Tbls of your choice of one of the following: jojoba oil, rose hip oil or fractionated coconut oil
- * 25 drops (1/4 tsp) of peppermint essential oil
- * 2 Tbls. Red sugar sprinkles.

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Pour the Epsom Salts into a large mixing bowl.
2. Add the oils and mix well.
3. Fold in the colored sugar sprinkles until they are evenly distributed.
4. Scoop the peppermint bath salts into jars and seal to maintain fragrance.

TO USE:

Pour a cup of the salts into a warm bath as the water is filling. Soak in the bath for at least 10-15 minutes to get the benefits of it.

A collection of sweet sentiments—each wrapped around a chocolate candy—makes a delectable present for that someone you just can't say enough good things about!

What You'll Need: A quart-size canning jar (to hold about 52 mini chocolate bars), chocolates wrapped with heartfelt notes. On the back of strips of decorative paper (the ones pictured are 2 3/4 by 1 3/8 inches), write a special message for the recipient, such as "I love your smile!" or "You make learning fun." Wrap the strips around mini candy bars (the ones pictured used Hershey's Miniatures) and secure them with tape.

What To Do: Embellish the lid with washi tape and decorative paper secured with glue, as shown. Use ribbon to attach a card stock tag labeled "Complimentary Chocolates."



Hand-Painted Art Jars

A bit of glass paint transforms thrift-store and recycling-bin finds into one-of-a-kind treasures. First, collect glass jars, bottles, and vases. Draw designs on them with glass paint markers ([Pebeo Vitrea 160 markers](#)). Set the paint according to the package instructions. To add a knob, paint a wood cabinet knob with acrylic paint. When it's dry, glue it to the lid with an epoxy suitable for glass (an adult's job).

Mission News!



This year for our Halloween Outreach we were falling a little behind in our need for candy one week before the event. We made our plea for candy and all of you really came through. We received more candy than we have ever had in that as a result. You are so generous. We filled 250 sandwich size Zip lock bags with 19 pieces of candy in

each bag plus a Halloween tract directed at children. The Elders handed out tracts directed to the adults. On Halloween night we passed out 232 bags of candy, plus other goodies like doughnut holes, cider, hot chocolate and coffee. It was a good night of community outreach!

Our shoebox ministry by Samaritan's Purse's "Operation Christmas Child" successful packed over one hundred boxes this year. We thank you and praise God for the opportunity to serve in this way. Our efforts are going literally around the world. Some of you brought in items to put in our collection box to pack in the shoeboxes, some brought in partially filled shoeboxes and asked us to make sure the essential items were included and some generously gave financially. Whatever you did, we appreciate it and we were able to pack 127 boxes that have been delivered to the collection site. I want to mention if you stay in a motel/hotel, please bring the mini soaps and put them in our collection box. We include 2 or 3 bars of mini soap in each shoebox and it saves us having to purchase soap. Also, next year we plan to have a garage sale like we did 2 years ago designating all proceeds to "OCC". So please be saving items you need to get rid of. Please talk to myself (Sandy Braid) or Karla Reed (raise your hand Karla 😊).



Also we send out checks to our Missionaries for Christmas. We started this program several years ago so we could bless our missionaries with an extra gift for Christmas. However, we have found our

funds a little short this year. We send out \$100 to ten missionaries making a total of \$1,000. We fell short by \$425.32 this year. So, with that news, once again we come before the people of our church asking for your help. Fortunately, we do have just a little excess in our mission fund, so in faith we mailed the checks out. But this does cause our mission fund to go extremely low. If you are able, please consider an extra gift to missions. And could I ask all of you to be praying for us.

Old Fashioned Christmas Potato Candy

- * 1 small potato
- * 1# confection sugar
- * 1 large bag of chocolate chips
- * nuts or fruit or both

1. Mash the warm potato,
2. stir in confection sugar,
3. add nuts or fruit
4. roll into balls
5. dip in melted chocolate
6. Store in the refrigerator

PEPPERMINT KISSED FUDGE



INGREDIENTS

- 10 oz. bag of Peppermint flavored Hershey Kisses
- 16 oz. container of Betty Crocker vanilla icing

INSTRUCTIONS

1. Unwrap the kisses and place them in a microwavable bowl. In 30-second intervals heat the kisses.
2. Microwave the frosting for about 15 seconds or until it's warmed through.
3. Pour the icing into the kisses and mix well, pat into a wax paper-lined square pan, and refrigerate until set, about an hour. Store in the freezer.

Eat individual pieces straight from the freezer, it's a bit sticky when it warms up, and really is there anything better than cold fudge?



No Bake Coconut Snowballs



These cookies only take about five minutes to make and taste just like candy when covered in melted chocolate. They're lovely to make for family gatherings or to fill in tins for cookie exchanges!

Ingredients

- 1 3/4 cup shredded coconut
- 3 tsp coconut oil
- 3 tbsp maple syrup
- 2 tbsp unsweetened coconut milk
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/8 tsp salt
- organic dark chocolate

Instructions

Place 1 cup shredded coconut and 3 tsp coconut oil into the bowl of a food processor. Process on high speed, scraping down the sides every once in a while, until it reaches a butter consistency.

Add the maple syrup, coconut milk, vanilla extract, and salt and process on high speed until all of the ingredients have combined.

Add 3/4 cup of additional shredded coconut and process on high speed until all of the ingredients have combined and formed a batter.

Shape the coconut mixture into 1" balls and coat with chocolate and the additional shredded coconut. Refrigerate for at least an hour or up to a week.

Bring to room temperature before servings

DIY Edible Glitter

- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon food coloring

Mix and bake for 10 minutes at 350°
