There's something nostalgic about the scents of autumn, the foliage with rich changing colors, the foods and holidays, traditions like apple picking and leaf piles, and cooler weather after a hot summer. As Christians, let us remember these 3 things about autumn:

#### 1. Autumn Refreshes Us with New Wonder

Spring brings its own beauty to the world, and it's a relief to see green and new growth after a long, harsh winter. Then spring morphs into summer, and after a while, green becomes the new normal. It's not necessarily that we get tired of green, but in a way, we get used to it.

a) "There's nothing wrong with the leaves. It's me: repetition inoculates me against wonder. Like G. K. Chesterton says, I don't have God's capacity to delight again and again at each

new leaf. He keeps unfurling them—they even wave to get my attention!—but the eyes of my soul glaze over."

b) "In autumn, the creativity of God hollers. Look at these things! These paper-thin solar cells that convert sunlight into acorns! They're everywhere, and they're made by a God who, as N. D. Wilson reminds us, doesn't know how to stop creating. Autumn reminds us that there's a world of wonder."

### 2. Autumn Reminds Us of the Promise of Glory

In our culture, we see glory in youth and newness. Aging is looked upon with a wary and skeptic eye. "We are spring-and-summer," people. But we can learn from change, Rhea shares,

"My parents' leaves are starting to change. Their color is silver rather than red, but the glory is the same. They may not have quite the same speed on the Frisbee field. But they have wisdom and grace and decades of joy that shine in their faces. They're taking on the beauty of autumn, showing dimensions of glory that my green summer-self doesn't display."

3. Autumn Prepares Us for Winter's Coming

Inevitably, autumn's beauty and wonder fades into winter's chilled silence. Autumn doesn't stay; it fades and falls away just like the leaves on the trees. Rhea expounds, "Autumn reminds us that our leaves too will die. The curse we inherited from our father-tree, Adam, means we have our seasons, and then we go. Winter takes us all."

This is a sobering thought. Just like autumn, I will not last forever on this earth. Winter is a stark reminder that there is a price for the curse we were born under...but there is hope. Rhea tells us.

"Autumn can draw our attention to the one man who broke through winter into an unending summer. The one who spent three days brown and dead in the dirt and came back in an indestructible green. The one who wasn't just a leaf; he was a whole new tree."

"Winter comes to us all. But winter isn't the end for Christians, because our lives are joined to a tree that winter cannot touch. Death has no sting; winter has no bite. We will fall from the tree of Adam, but we will flower again in a spring of eternal, glorious growth."

It's this truth, according to Rhea, that "gives us the hope to die beautifully." When I die, I don't want to be clinging to the edges of this earth, begging for one more tainted day. I want to die with grace, falling back into the arms of my Savior, knowing that His beauty is greater than anything I could compare on this earth.

# Twisted Scripture

John 9:2

"His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?"

Pg 1132 Apologetics Bible

The Eastern idea of reincarnation teaches that after we die, we are destined to return as someone else in another life. Followers of Hinduism and Buddhism believe that how you live now (called "karma, "which can be made of of either good or bad things) determines whether your next life will be pleasant of miserable. Taken out of context, one might use John 9:2 to argue that the disciples believed in reincarnation, yet Jesus answered their question in a way that proves the impossibility of someone sinning before birth, and hence the impossibility of karma and reincarnation. He said the man was born with an affliction not because he sinned in a past life, but "so that God's works might be displayed in him" (vs. 3). Hebrews 9:27 further supports the impossibility of karma and reincarnation when it says, "it is appointed for people to dies once" before the judgment comes. That is why 'now is the day of salvation' (2 Corinthians 6:2). Resurrection, not reincarnation, is what awaits us after death.

#### John 3:5

'Jesus answered, "Very truly I tell you, no one can enter the kingdom of God unless they are born of water and the Spirit."'

This verse is often used to justify the mistaken belief that water baptism is required for salvation. There are several problems with this interpretation. First, Jesus elsewhere said that He came to 'seek and to save the lost" (Luke 19:10). Since the New Testament never says Jesus baptized anyone, it seems obvious that baptism is unnecessary for salvation. Second, rather than baptizing, Jesus went around teaching everyone who He was and telling them that it was necessary to believe in Him. In His own words, "God loved the world in this way: He gave His one and Only Son, so that everyone who believes in Him will not perish but have eternal live" (John 3:16). Furthermore, He made it clear that condemnation is based not on failure to be baptized, but on failure to believe in Him (John 3:16). Finally, if baptism is a requirement for justification before God, it would conflict with the biblical teaching that salvation comes by faith alone (Galatians 2:16; Ephesians 2:8-9)

#### Luke 23:44-46

'It was now about noon, and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon, for the sun stopped shining. And the curtain of the temple was torn in two. Jesus called out with a loud voice, "Father, into your hands I commit my spirit." When he had said this, he breathed his last.'

Some critics claim that Jesus merely fainted during His crucifixion, and was mistaken for dead, and was then hauled down and buried alive. Further, they say that He escaped the tomb and appeared to His disciples, who mistakenly believed that He was resurrected. However, there are sure signs that Jesus actually died. The Roman soldiers usually broke the legs of the crucifixion victims to speed up their deaths. When they set out to break Jesus' legs, they discovered that He was already dead (John 19:33). To prove this to themselves, the soldiers pierced Jesus' heart through His side (John 19:34). This would have killed Him if He wasn't already dead. In addition, blood loss due to His flogging and the piercing of His hands and feet (which would have severed arteries and nerves) made death inevitable. Also, the skeptic must explain how it's possible that a badly wounded Jesus could escape a closed tomb, sneak past Roman guards, and go on to convince His followers that He had conquered death.
















## **Operation Christmas Child**


## Halloween Outreach


#### Ingredients

- ☐ 4 cups riced cauliflower
- ☐ ½ cup water
- ☐ ¼ cup grated parmesan cheese
- □ legg
- ☐ ¼ tsp or less of each: salt & pepper, divided
- 1¼ lb. boneless, skinless chicken thighs cut into bite-sized cubes
- ☐ ½ cup diced celery
- ☐ ½ cup diced kabocha squash
- ☐ ½ cup quartered button mushrooms
- ☐ ½ cup cut green beans
- ☐ 1-2 sprigs of fresh thyme
- □ 1 cup chicken broth
- ☐ 1 cup unsweetened almond milk

#### Directions

- Preheat oven to 400°F.
- Combine cauliflower and water in microwave-safe bowl. Microwave for 5 minutes or until cauliflower is tender. Drain and allow cauliflower to cool. Place cauliflower in a cheesecloth to squeeze out as much liquid as possible
- 3. Mix 3/4 of the riced cauliflower with the parmesan cheese and egg. Reserve the other 1/4 of riced cauliflower for later.
- On a baking sheet lined with parchment paper, spread cauliflower mixture into 4 equally-sized circles that will fit the inside circumference of your serving bowls. Bake cauliflower crusts until center is dry and crust is golden brown.
- Add the remaining ingredients to an Instant Pot, including the reserved riced cauliflower, to make the potpie filling. Secure lid, push meat/stew mode, and adjust time for 10 minutes. When Instant Pot beeps, naturally release pressure.
- Ladle chicken potpie filling into bowls and top each with a cauliflower crust.

Slow Cooker Method: Make the cauliflower crust as direct. Add all of the remaining ingredients for the potpie filling to a slow cooker. Cover with lid, and cook on low for 2 hours.

### Spaghetti Squash Gratin

1 lean - 3 Green - 0 Healthy fat - 3 Condiment (per serving)

#### Ingredients:

- 1 lb. 3-oz. spaghetti squash
- 1 egg
- ½ cup reduced-fat shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/4 cup plain low-fat Greek yogurt
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> tsp fresh thyme
- 1/8 tsp salt
- ½ tsp pepper
- 2 tablespoons reduced-fat grated Parmesan cheese
- Cooking spray

#### Directions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°F.
- 2. Halve the squash and scoop out the seeds. Bake face down on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper until squash is easily pierced with a fork, about 30 minutes. Allow to cool, then scoop out spaghetti strands and place in a large bowl.
- 3. Meanwhile, in a medium-sized bowl, mix remaining ingredients except for the parmesan cheese. Stir the mixture into the spaghetti squash
- 4. Spread into a lightly greased casserole dish. Top with parmesan and press down to moisten. Bake uncovered for 30 minutes.
